Message from our Leadership

It has been a tough year for children. Across the globe, children faced a cascade of crises. Thankfully, despite facing increased costs of living here at home, the dedication of our incredible UNICEF Canada supporters did not waver in 2022.

In February, the war in Ukraine sparked displacement on a scale and speed not seen since World War II. But the solidarity shown to the families of Ukraine is an example of the best that humanity has to offer. Thanks to UNICEF Canada's generous donors and partners, we raised more than \$13 million to reach children affected by the conflict.

And as the war in Ukraine exacerbated skyrocketing global food and fuel prices, we were quickly reminded that humanitarian emergencies are not bound by national borders. In the 15 hardest-hit countries, the global hunger crisis pushed one child into severe malnutrition every minute. Working together, we scaled up our efforts to provide life-saving healthcare services to children in these countries, while building resilience for the future.

We also started implementing UNICEF Canada's 2022-2025 strategic plan, our road map to increase our reach for even more children sustainably, and secure our role as the leading advocate for child rights with governments. We worked with youth leaders across Canada to advise policymakers on issues that are close to their hearts: racism, the climate crisis, civic participation, income inequity and mental health.

In conjunction with the United Nations General Assembly, UNICEF Canada's Women UNlimited members travelled to New York City to dig deeper into the impacts of advocating for children. We also celebrated our 30th Water for Life Galas — an important milestone and a reminder of the incredible generosity and support of the Calgary and Halifax communities.

As we look ahead, our work to reach children at greatest risk has never been more critical. From Eastern Europe to Pakistan, and from the Sahel to Yemen, UNICEF is there for children in 190 countries and territories. We cannot thank you enough for your unwavering support and your commitment to giving every child a fair chance to reach their full potential.

► Women UNlimited: UNGA Connected

Twenty-three members of UNICEF Canada's philanthropy circle Women UNlimited came together in New York City, during the 77th Session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA). Hosted by UNICEF Canada, the *"Connected" sessions* facilitated a deep dive into UNICEF's leadership and work for children everywhere, and the far-reaching impacts of donor support.

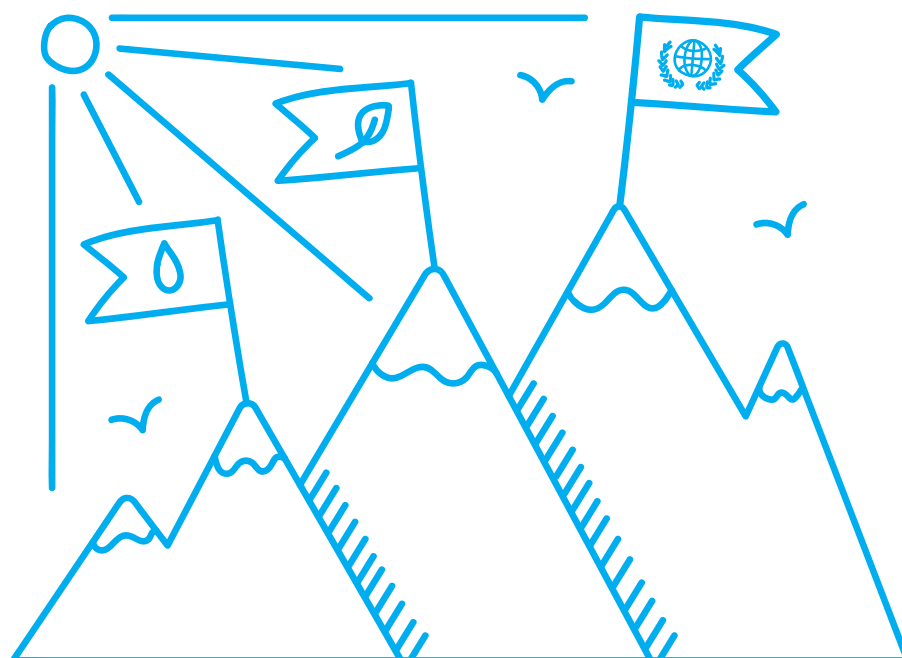
Women UNlimited members heard from youth advocates representing 13 countries

and five continents. Other highlights included a keynote talk by Dr. Maliha Khan, President and CEO of Women Deliver, on sexual and reproductive rights for adolescent girls. During the same week, the Government of Canada formally pledged \$35 million at the UNGA to support UNICEF's work treating severe acute malnutrition.

From 2015 to the end of 2022, UNICEF Canada's women's philanthropy programs cumulatively raised \$12 million for maternal, child and newborn health, and education programs, across eight countries.

► Water for Life Galas: Celebrating 30 Years

UNICEF Canada's Water for Life Galas in *Calgary* and *Halifax* celebrated an exceptional 30-year anniversary in 2022. The Galas have cumulatively raised more than \$21.5 million to help children around the world access safe water and sanitation systems. The generosity and commitment of our Calgary and Halifax supporters have made the Water for Life Galas two of UNICEF's most important fundraising events in North America.



A Bundle of Hope

Sustaining children's and women's healthcare in Ukraine



Like many parents-to-be, Halyna and Nazar worried about prepping for their baby's arrival in time. Then war erupted across Ukraine. They drove west for two days to Lviv for relative safety, not knowing what circumstances their son would be born into. Danylo was born at a Lviv maternity hospital, amid the sound of air raid sirens. Similar stories made headlines in Canada as attacks targeted Ukrainian healthcare facilities, sent families to shelter underground, and forced the largest exodus of child refugees in Europe since World War II.

Children's Healthcare Canada and **Pediatric Chairs of Canada** recognized the extreme challenges of Ukraine's medical community. They supported UNICEF in helping to ensure continuity of care for medically fragile children. Their fundraising appeal "Help, Hope and Healing for Ukrainian Children" attracted donations to UNICEF from individuals, healthcare organizations, pediatric departments and hospital foundations across Canada. The **CMA Foundation** generously matched these gifts—and their grant was matched once more by **Scotiabank**, **MD Financial Management**, and the **Canadian Medical Association**.

In Canada, over \$13.5 million was raised in 2022 for our Ukraine emergency fund, from generous individual donors, family foundations, groups, clubs, businesses and associations. For hospitals in Ukraine (one of many supports reaching children and families), donors helped bring life-saving medical supplies to 1,005 facilities. Included were 30,000 medical kits, more than 2,200 items of critical equipment, 420 infant warmers and more. UNICEF also helped outfit bomb shelters at 50 children's hospitals and perinatal centres. In all, 4,926,077 children and women accessed life-saving primary care in UNICEF-supported facilities last year.

While Halyna and Nazar didn't expect to parent in a war, they caught a glimmer of hope as they opened a UNICEF box of essential baby items, provided in hospital. Halyna said with a grateful smile, "Everything here is really needed."

The Path to Zero Hunger

Advocacy for a global response

Conflict, climate change, and the ongoing economic effects of COVID-19 have fuelled an unprecedented hunger crisis in regions around the world. In 2022, the number of severely malnourished children grew to one child per minute in 15 crisis-hit countries. UNICEF scaled up work spanning the Horn of Africa and Central Sahel regions, as well as Madagascar, Afghanistan, Yemen and Haiti.

Two-year-old Israa in Sudan is relatively fortunate. Her family accessed UNICEF's ready-to-use therapeutic food (RUTF) Plumpy'Nut® at a health centre that diagnosed her with severe acute malnutrition. Thankfully, Israa had not yet reached the stage of severe wasting: the most deadly form of malnutrition. At that stage, a child is too ill to digest regular food, and RUTF becomes truly life saving. UNICEF procures nearly 80 per cent of the world's RUTF, but even it has not escaped rising food and fuel costs. Moreover, it is not a solution; children like Israa could become severely malnourished again. Global investment is critical to help prevent severe malnutrition—not just treat it.

UNICEF Canada's own international policy team contributed to momentum leading up to a landmark response by the federal government. During the first months of 2022, staff met with Members of Parliament and with The Honourable Harjit Sajjan, Minister of International Development. On June 23, Prime Minister Trudeau announced a \$250-million funding commitment to tackle global food security and nutrition. It includes \$35 million specifically for UNICEF's global work treating severe acute malnutrition. The investment was allocated at September's United Nations General Assembly.

We are grateful to Minister Sajjan's office for consistently welcoming discussions with UNICEF Canada about international development assistance, as a path to realizing the UN Sustainable Development Goal of "zero hunger" by 2030. We also acknowledge the influence of UNICEF Canada supporters, advocates and peer organizations, who joined us in calling for the global hunger crisis and child malnutrition to be top priorities for high-income nations.

Water for Life

30 years supporting the world's children



Calgary's 'Water for Life Gala' and Halifax's 'Chefs for UNICEF Water for Life Gala' achieved a 30-year milestone in 2022—and remarkable fundraising results—as they enthusiastically returned to in-person celebrations.

Last year's rejuvenated Galas brought the events' cumulative fundraising total to \$21.5 million. This longstanding success is owed to generous repeat supporters, in-kind donations and committed volunteers. Their dedication has ranked the Galas among the most significant UNICEF fundraising events in North America.

Funds have supported life-changing water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) initiatives in Uganda; Namibia; Syria; South Sudan; Cambodia; Ghana; Chad and Mongolia. The 2022 Galas directed funds to WASH areas of greatest need. In addition, event guests purchased Water for Life Bundles (containing soap, water purification tablets and oral rehydration salts), and water pumps.

The high-energy live auction of water pumps has been a highlight each year; a record-breaking 612 water pumps were sold in 2022. Collectively, the pumps will provide safe water for 91,800 people for up to 10 years.

Says Calgary Gala Co-chair Susanne Fox, “I’m so proud to be a volunteer with UNICEF Canada, and more specifically the UNICEF Calgary community. It’s an incredible group of talented, diverse and generous human beings.”

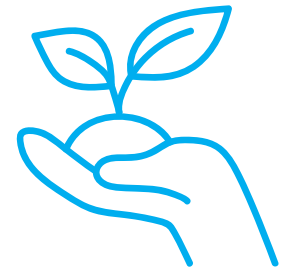

Giving for the Greatest Impact



Long-time UNICEF Canada supporter and Quebec resident Claude Dussault says he gives with his heart and his head. “It’s the emotional side that drives me, but there is also the rational side that knows philanthropy is an investment. It’s about helping to have the largest impact.”

Mr. Dussault’s first gift was through his employer’s response to the tsunamis that devastated South Asia’s coasts on December 26, 2004. He was compelled by the scope of UNICEF’s emergency response for children and families in the eight hardest-hit countries. In the years since the tsunamis, UNICEF-led efforts greatly improved healthcare, education and sanitation, while enhancing security and disaster-preparedness in these regions.

“I learned about the credibility of UNICEF around the world, and its ability to intervene because they have been on the ground with expertise in so many places, for so many years before an emergency arises,” he explains.

I also believe that investing in children’s education is the way to meet the needs of future generations.”

Upon asking to become more involved with UNICEF, Mr. Dussault learned about girls’ education—a high-return investment for strengthening communities and countries. He has previously fulfilled a major gift to UNICEF Canada’s UNdaunted campaign for girls’ education. He also made a donation in 2022 to support girls’ education in Haiti, and the emergency response in Ukraine. Mr. Dussault’s generosity extended to volunteering as a UNICEF Canada board member from 2011 to 2017. He continues to advocate for children as part of our Honorary Council.

Recalling a 2016 program delegation to Jordan, Mr. Dussault says, “It was transformational. My own granddaughter was four months old at the time and, at this health centre, a mother who had fled Syria put her four-month-old daughter into my arms. I thought: if I could help to shift a bit the bad draw this little girl had, that was great incentive to keep supporting UNICEF.”

We thank Mr. Dussault for sharing his story and for being a long-time member of the UNICEF family.

A Legacy for Children's Education in Bangladesh

Throughout Carol Eggen's life, no one ever heard her say the words, "I can't do that." Her younger sister Sharon Rutherford recalls Carol's ambition from her earliest years.

Carol was extremely determined to succeed at whatever she tackled.”

That drive led Carol from Saskatchewan to Bangladesh in 1972, at age 30, to help create a school for physiotherapy. Thousands of people were struggling with injuries from the Bangladesh Liberation War of 1971. She knew that physiotherapy could help them. It was the beginning of a deep love for the people of Bangladesh. She adopted a brother and sister from an orphanage in 1975, raising them in Canada and their birth country.

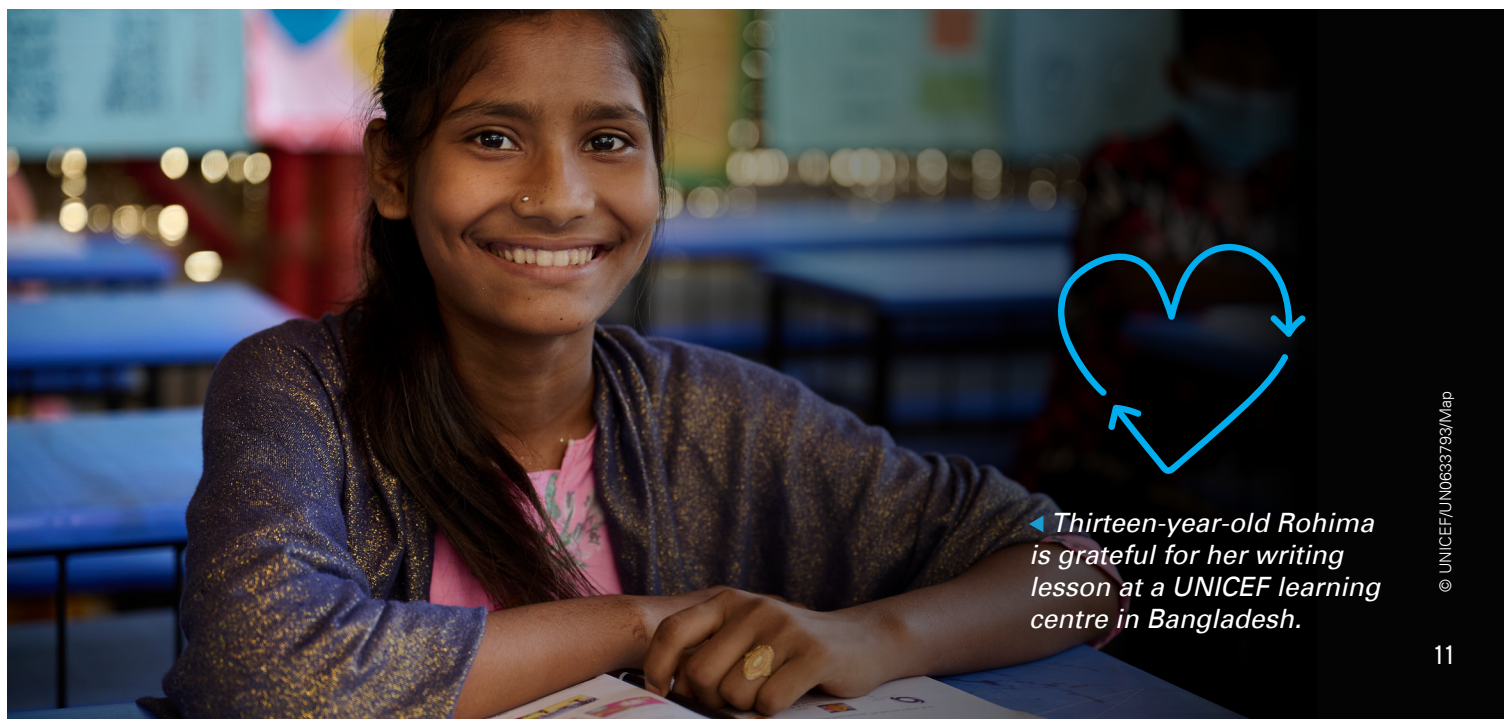
Carol eventually shifted her career away from physiotherapy to focus on the rights of women and girls in Bangladesh. Fluent in spoken and written Bangla, she worked in communities

alongside organizations like UNICEF and other implementing partners to bring practical support to women and adolescent girls, so they could attend school and become income earners.

In her Will, Carol gifted one of the largest bequests that UNICEF Canada has ever received. The gift was realized in December 2022, dedicated to supporting children's education in Bangladesh. Her legacy to other Bangladeshi organizations is also helping to support underprivileged girls, as well as children and young adults with cerebral palsy.

Twenty years after opening the physiotherapy school, Carol was delighted to learn that one of her students had since emigrated to Red Deer, Alberta, and was running his very own practice. It was a full-circle moment; her Canadian home was in nearby Calgary at the time. We are tremendously grateful to Carol for trusting in UNICEF to protect the right to education for children in Bangladesh.

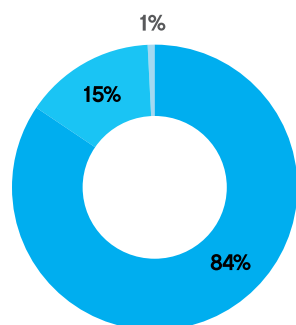

◀ Thirteen-year-old Rohima is grateful for her writing lesson at a UNICEF learning centre in Bangladesh.

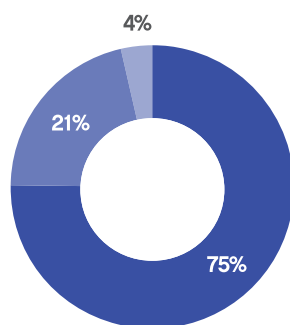

SOURCES OF REVENUE



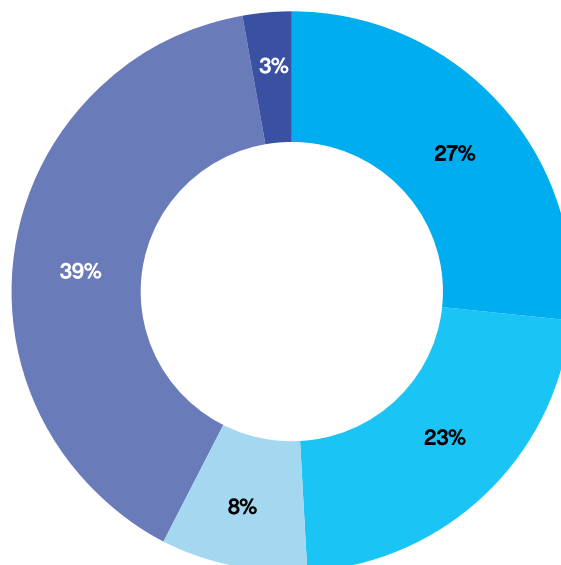

Frequently Asked Questions

► How do you spend donor dollars?

For every dollar raised, UNICEF Canada spends 75 cents (three-year average) on programs to help children around the world survive and realize their rights. In 2022, this amounted to \$48,049,036. The impact of donor dollars is multiplied many times over through UNICEF's unique ability to collaborate and scale up projects for even more children. Our cost of fundraising and administration is a three-year average of 25%, which compares favourably with sector standards. Our best practices in transparency, accountability, ethical fundraising, staff management and governance have repeatedly earned us Imagine Canada's Standards Accreditation.

► Does UNICEF receive funding from the United Nations?

No. Although we are considered part of the UN family of organizations, we rely entirely on voluntary contributions from individuals, foundations and corporations—as well as grants from governments who trust UNICEF to create results and impact for children.

► How does the Government of Canada support UNICEF?

As a high-income nation, Canada contributes international development funding to UNICEF's headquarters, supporting global priorities for children. In 2022, Canada was the third-highest government donor to UNICEF, behind the United States and Germany. Additionally, UNICEF Canada has fostered a positive advocacy relationship with Global Affairs Canada on international policy issues, earning the trust of Government stakeholders. As a result, the Government has previously granted funds directly to UNICEF Canada to support specific initiatives managed by our own programs staff (e.g., UNdaunted in Somalia, the Eliminate Project, and Saving Children's Lives). UNICEF Canada did not receive any Government grants in 2022.

► What is UNICEF Canada doing to become a more anti-racist and anti-discrimination organization?

Diversity, equity and inclusion is one of three top priorities in our 2022-2025 Strategic Plan. We seek to become the organization of choice for all people in Canada who want to protect and promote child rights, and to increase our ability to engage and be an ally for diverse communities.

► How is UNICEF different from other humanitarian and development organizations focused on children?

UNICEF has presence in more than 190 countries and territories. We ensure that our innovative methods and programs are sustainable, by partnering with key actors on the ground (governments, communities and local partners) to expand impact. As part of the UN family, we have a unique influence with governments that helps to scale up and sustain successful initiatives. UNICEF is the only organization named in the 1989 Convention on the Rights of the Child.

► What do you do to help children in Canada?

UNICEF is the world's largest collector of data on every aspect of being a child. This helps us identify needs so we can advocate for the rights of every child, everywhere—including in Canada. We bring together young people from across Canada to advocate for policy changes and the involvement of youth in policy decisions that affect their well-being.
