In the past year, a multitude of conflicts and crises upended the lives of children. It's estimated that the percentage of those affected by conflict has almost doubled since the 1990s, increasing to more than one in six children globally.

At the same time, long-standing commitments to international development are being pulled back, with sources of funding that once seemed guaranteed in jeopardy.

In our ever-changing environment, one thing remains the same: children around the world continue to need our support. This simple fact not only reaffirms UNICEF's role in international development, but makes your role as a UNICEF donor even more important.

For 70 years, UNICEF has demonstrated an ability to develop solutions for children, some living in extremely complex situations. 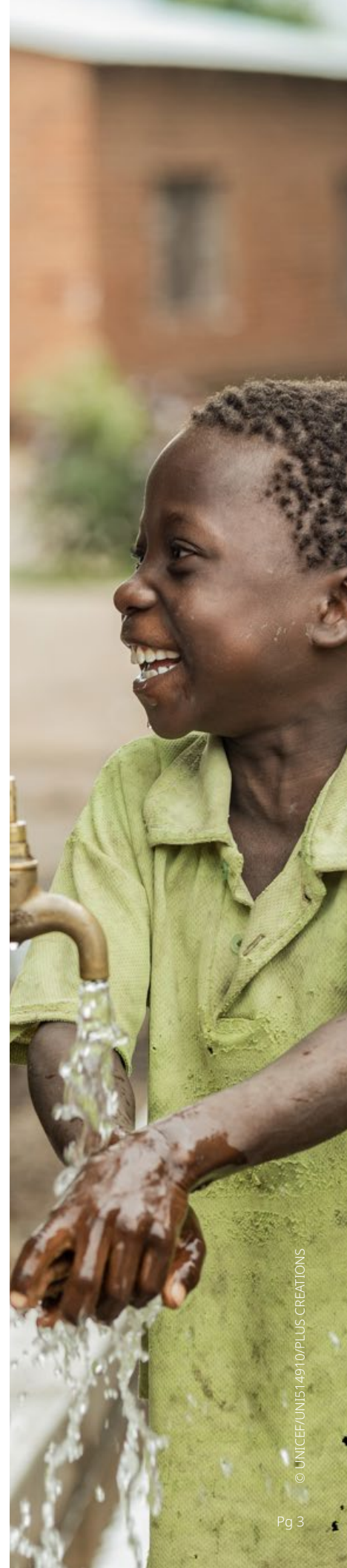

Global Impact

Trailblazing solutions for the world's children

Millions of children's lives are changed through the collective action of UNICEF and our global community of supporters. As more children are affected by conflicts, crises and climate disasters than ever before, UNICEF's ability to deliver proven, integrated solutions has never been more important. With you by our side, there's no limit to what we can achieve for children and families around the world.

- Over **34 million babies** were safely delivered in UNICEF-supported health facilities across **86 countries** in one year.
- Over **35 million people** were able to access safe and readily available water with UNICEF's assistance in one year.
- UNICEF procured over **2 billion doses** of life-saving vaccines this year, reaching nearly half of the world's children and saving **4.4 million lives**.

Protecting children through learning

In Afghanistan, nine-year-old Khadija was one of millions of children not in school, putting her at a greater risk of child marriage, child labour and violence. UNICEF established a community-based classroom in her village, opening doors to a brighter future. Because for Khadija, it's more than just a classroom — it's a haven that offers her and her friends the opportunity to learn, grow and play away from harm.

Emergencies

Protecting children, delivering hope

Today, there are more children in need of humanitarian assistance than at any other time since the Second World War. More than one in six children now live in areas affected by conflicts globally, preventing them from accessing critical aid like vaccines, healthcare, nutrition, water and education.

Against all odds, UNICEF, with your support, was there in the world's toughest places providing life-saving assistance to millions of children in emergencies in 2024.



Preventing the spread of polio in Gaza

For baby Alaa and her family, the conflict in Gaza had already taken so much from them. Then polio resurfaced in the summer of 2024 for the first time in 25 years. Despite the ongoing crisis, UNICEF and partners took immediate action to help stop the spread of the disease. Through a critical polio vaccination campaign, UNICEF reached more than half a million children under 10, such as Alaa.

“Vaccinating my daughter was a relief after so much struggle,” says Alaa’s mother. “I am grateful to UNICEF for providing vaccines for children.”

How UNICEF brought water back to an entire city

In Sloviansk, Ukraine, 13-year-old Bohdan spent the summer walking for over an hour to fetch water from a well in a neighbouring area. “We had no water for three and a half months because of the shelling,” says Bohdan. “I helped my mom, grandma and grandpa. We'd carry five containers at a time.”


In 2024, UNICEF was able to help reconstruct the city's main water and sanitation networks, so families no longer have to make difficult choices between drinking, cooking, washing or bathing their children. Instead of fetching water, Bohdan can spend his time being a kid and doing what he loves most — dancing.




“It's amazing to have water right at home,” says Bohdan. “I can just turn on the tap. After dance practice, I can shower immediately. Also, the water is clean now.”

Climate Education

Clean water keeps children learning in Ecuador

Water scarcity has dramatically increased because of climate change, impacting the lives of millions of children. UNICEF is working tirelessly to ensure water services in schools and communities around the world are climate-resilient to protect children's health and futures.

In Ecuador, for example, over **2,600 schools** struggle to provide clean water for drinking, hand washing or toilets. To keep children learning, UNICEF is creating safe, sustainable schools in Ecuador that adapt to the changing climate through the **Smart Resilient Schools Program**. With flexible education funding from our supporters like UNICEF Canada's women-led collective giving circle, **Women UNlimited**, the program equips schools with climate-resilient solutions, such as rainwater harvesting systems and solar panels for renewable energy. It also empowers children to learn about using resources responsibly to care for the planet.



Thanks to UNICEF's Smart Resilient Schools Program, Merlía, 10, and Ángel, 12, now have clean water at the Ejército Ecuatoriano School in Lago Agrio, Ecuador. At least 10 students would get sick from drinking the school's water every day. With access to safe water, students can stay healthy, excel in their studies, and work toward their dreams.

Education paves the way for climate action

UNICEF, with the support of the [Women UNlimited Program](#), is working to provide tens of thousands of children in Ecuador with safe, inclusive education that fosters environmental responsibility and resilience. In 2024, we helped:

- Reach **25,500 young children** with improved community-based early childhood care, education and parenting programs;
- **10,230 out-of-school and at-risk children** access vital educational support; and
- Develop standards to ensure equitable education for children with disabilities, reaching over **22,700 children and teachers**.

In Mongolia, climate-related shocks like floods, wildfires, droughts and extreme winter conditions are on the rise, with young children being the most vulnerable. We thank the Walker Family for supporting UNICEF's work in Mongolia to provide green early childhood development programs aimed at preparing children to adapt to climate shocks. Thanks to their generosity, an estimated **65,000 children** will be impacted over the next three years.

Highlighting the impact of wildfires on children

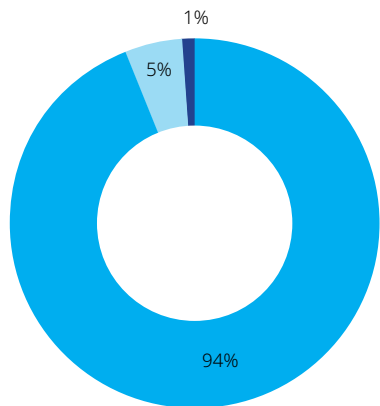

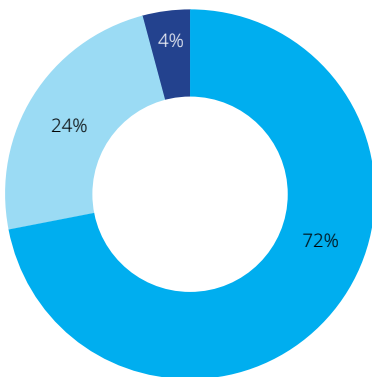

SOURCES OF REVENUE



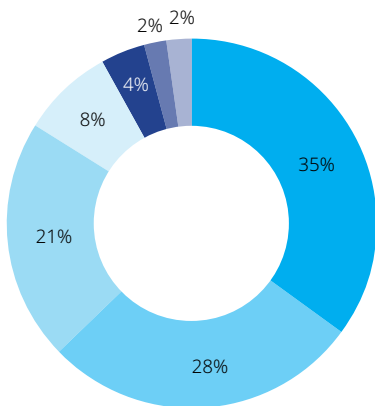
